

Runham Village Hall Survey December 2022 – January 2023

Summary

This report sets out the background to the need for a survey relating to the village hall repair costs, and summarises the responses received from the community. Mautby Parish Council is invited to consider the results of this survey as part of the budget and precept setting process, with a view to whether an application to borrow will be made. It is intended that this report will be published on the Parish Council's website.

Background

In late November 2022 the Village Hall in Runham suffered a partial collapse of the ceiling, revealing water ingress over a sustained period of time which had caused significant damage to parts of the roof and ceiling. The Hall was closed and remains closed to the public.

The Village Hall has a suspended ceiling within the main hall space, with a further ceiling above (to the original height of the school ceiling). Above this there is a roof space. The ceiling collapse was thought to have been caused by the weight of damp / water penetrating the plasterboard upper ceiling, collapsing onto the suspended ceiling and through to the floor.

A visit by a builder who took photos has ascertained that there is a significant amount of debris within the upper roof space which has been brought in by owl(s) living within the roof for a number of years. This debris needs to be removed before damage to ceiling joists and rafters can be assessed – it is not known whether these have suffered dry rot from the owl faeces and need replacing. The suspended ceiling, together with its electrical fittings, needs to be removed and the main ceiling revealed. The building needs to be made watertight, the bell tower assessed for safety, and various load bearing beams checked and replaced as necessary – wet rot is clearly visible in the photographs. Also within the photos it is clear that the plasterboard upper ceiling is bowing and needs replacing, preferably with an insulating version. New insulation will be required in the roof space, decorating of the newly revealed areas, and new light fittings to replace those that were in the suspended ceiling. Finally, an option for installing energy efficient heaters is being considered.

The Current Situation

At an additional meeting of Mautby Parish Council in December 2022 it was decided that the Council should explore all avenues to repair the Village Hall. The Council was advised of a budget figure of £50,000 plus VAT. Following that meeting, the Village Hall Committee (a separate, unconstituted body who manages the day to day running of the Village Hall) offered £22,000 towards the project. Although avenues for grant funding are being explored, these are very limited because this is a project of repair and not improvements, which most funders will not fund. This will continue to be explored. Including a £7,000 contingency, the Council is looking potentially at borrowing £35,000 to fund the repair project. The sealed bid tenders will be opened at the Council's January 2023 meeting, and considered further at the February 2023 meeting. Advice will also be sought regarding VAT implications, which may need to be factored into the project.


The Survey

Attached at Appendix A is the full survey of the parishioners of Mautby, Runham and Thrigby, who make up the tax payers of the parish. There are approx. 383 residents in 145 households within the entire civil parish (2011 census). The survey was hand delivered to every household, with options for return to either a local address in Runham, or the Parish Clerk in Rollesby; and it was also made available online. It was promoted via social media and word of mouth.

Responses and Results

61 responses were received to the survey (15.93% of the community). Some of these may be on behalf of the whole household.

Of these, 50 (81.97%) were in favour of raising the precept to pay for the repairs.



The next questions were freeflow comments, and have been reproduced in the next pages. Any identifying information has been removed, and the Clerk has made relevant annotations where incorrect assumptions have been made. The comments have been reproduced as submitted.

RUNHAM VILLAGE HALL CONSULTATION

Mautby Parish Council is inviting all residents to give their views on the future of Runham Village Hall. The hall, built in 1889, was the former village school up until the late 60's, is part of the village's history, and is one of the few community amenities we have in the parish.

The building has suffered some water ingress around both gables which has damaged part of the original internal roof and ceiling timbers and the ceiling covering, meaning that repairs to these areas are now required to enable the hall's continued use, and for these reasons it is presently closed. The Parish Council, which owns the hall, is working with local builders to understand the extent and cost of repairs required and at the same time make some improvements to bring the hall up to more modern standards to make it better for users. The potential cost of this repair and improvement work is currently envisaged to be around £50,000 (in the process of being confirmed). Toward that sum the Village Hall Committee, who run events from the hall, will contribute £22,000 of Covid relief grant previously received, (some of which has already been spent on internal improvements including the toilets).

Both the Parish Council and Village Hall Committee are keen to carry out the required repairs and improvements to get the hall back into use, but to do so will require a loan (at a preferential rate through HM Treasury) for the balance of funds required, which would be repaid by an increase in council tax for residents over future years.

How this could affect residents

A small proportion of our Council Tax (called the parish precept) is collected annually on behalf of the parish to pay for local community services and spaces, which would need to increase to fund the work and the loan.

In 2022/23 the Mautby Parish Council precept amount was £28.97 per household and to fund a loan of, for example, £35,000 over 10 years, this amount per household would rise for a "Band D" property by around £29.10 annually (an extra **£2.91 monthly** over 10 months)². Note that the exact loan amount is yet to be confirmed.

(In comparison, the average precept across England in 21/22 was £71.86¹ and our neighbouring village, Stokesby with Herringby, was £44.73).

The Parish Council needs to know that these proposals have the support of the parish, and would ask and encourage everyone to complete the survey overleaf. Any possible contributions from local residents and businesses of services, materials or funds would also be particularly welcomed,
